

History of The Methven Lodge, No. 51, N.Z.C.

Consecrated on Tuesday, 30th October, 1883, as The Methven Lodge, No. 694, Scottish Constitution.

Narrative compiled by V.W. Bro. W. J. Currie, P.G.D.C., Lodge Historian for the Centenary meeting held on Friday, 21st October, 1983.

"Let that Blessing be restored to the Candidate"

How often have we heard those words spoken since our own Initiation, and each time we know that we have made a new Brother, and are reminded of the lasting friendships we have made.

For over forty years there had been settlers in the bays and around the coast, and on the arrival of the first four ships at Port Cooper in December, 1850, Freemasonry began to spread out into the settlements, and country including Methyen.

The history of The Methven Lodge is similar to many of the early Lodges established in New Zealand to bring together the few known

Masons settled in the District.

Five preliminary meetings were held in Bro. Robert Patton's Hotel prior to the Consecration. The first meeting was held on the 22nd June, 1883, to discuss the advisability of forming a Masonic Lodge in Methyen. Those present were Bros. Loudon, Patton, Scrimgeour, Black, Muschamp, Atyeo and McWilliams. Bro. Loudon occupied the Chair, and it was unanimously agreed to form a Lodge. A good discussion took place, but it was felt that a larger attendance was necessary to decide the Constitution under which the Lodge should be registered. All present promised to give their support to the Lodge irrespective of Constitution. Bro. McWilliams was appointed Secretary and with Bros. Patton and Black were instructed to circularise all known Masons in the District, informing them that it had been agreed to form a Lodge in Methven and requesting them to attend a meeting in Patton's Hotel, on the 29th June, to discuss a Charter, and the Constitution under which it should apply for. This meeting was attended by ten Brethren: Bros. John Loudon, Robert Patton, Duncan Cameron, John Scrimgeour, John Black, William Rowse, Robert Muschamp, William Compton, William Morgan and John McWilliams. After a discussion on the Merits of each Constitution, Bros. Scrimgeour and Cameron moved that the Charter be applied under the Scottish Constitution, Bros. Compton and Muschamp moved an amendment that it be under the English Constitution. The motion was by show of hands, the amendment was lost by three votes to seven; the motion was then put to the meeting and carried.

It was resolved to name the Lodge "The Methven Lodge."

Bro. Patton was appointed Treasurer and Brethren agreed to pay two pounds sterling to cover preliminary expenses. The Secretary was instructed to write to the District Grand Lodge of Canterbury, S.C. advising that it had been decided to form a Lodge in Methven. On the 10th August, a reply was received from the District Grand Master advising that a Dispensation would be granted on the receipt of a Petition signed by no less than eleven registered Masons irrespective of Constitution. This was duly completed and forwarded to the District Grand Lodge.

The following Brethren were nominated and elected to sign the Petition as Officers of the Lodge.

A temporary Charter was granted by the R.W. District Grand Master, dated 28th August, 1883, for the Methven Lodge.

The Ceremony of Consecration was conducted in the School House, Jackson Street, on Tuesday, 30th October, 1883, by the District Grand Lodge of Canterbury. The Secretary read the minutes of the five preliminary meetings which were confirmed by the R.W. District Grand Master, R.W. Bro. Rev. James Hill, Dist. G.M. assisted by W. Bro. C. A. C. Hardy of South Rakaia Lodge, No. 1857 E.C. and W. Bro. W. Hilliard of Ionic Lodge, No. 1917 E.C. performed the Ceremony in Due and Ancient Form. The following District Grand Lodge Officers assisted at the Installation of Bro. John Loudon Master Elect, and the Investiture of Officers; W. Bro. J. Grubb, D.G.S.W., W. Bro. D. McFarlane, D.G.J.W., W. Bro. H. T. Gourlay, D.G.D.C., W. Bro. J. Tait, D.G.S.D., W. Bro. F. W. Francis, D.G.J.D., Bro. T. W. Longuet, D.G.I.G., Bro. J. G. Hodge, D.G. Tyler. The Lodge being in the Third Degree, R.W. Bro. James Hill, Installed Bro. John Loudon into the Chair of King Solomon according to Ancient Form and Custom. Being

a new Lodge and having no Regalia the elected Officers were duly Installed. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the District Grand Master, his Officers and visiting Brethren for their attendance, a total of twenty-two Brethren. At the invitation of the R.W. Master, the Brethren adjourned to Bro. Patton's Hotel where a Banquet had been prepared.

Because of slow transport which was by ship, the Charter from the Grand Lodge of Scotland was not dated until the 7th February, 1884, and The Methyen Lodge was Registered as No. 694.

Lodge meetings were first held in the School House, and later in the Library. In 1886, the Lodge obtained the use of the Assembly room, upstairs in the Methven Hotel. Meetings were held there until 1890, when because of the death on the 20th October, 1889 of the Secretary, W. Bro. Robert Patton, the Lodge returned to the Library and continued to meet there until the erection of the present Lodge building in Chapman Street, in April, 1907.

It was not always convenient to hold Lodge Meetings in rented premises, and in the early 1890's the idea of owning a meeting place began to influence the Brethren. The first move was on the 23rd April, 1891, when Bro. John Baker proposed that twenty pounds be set aside to provide the nucleus of a building fund. This was carried unanimously, but the motion was rescinded in August on account of lack of funds. However, on the 6th October, 1892, under notice of motion it was again resolved that the sum of twenty pounds be deposited in the Bank of New Zealand, Rakaia, for a building fund. A very generous gift, on the 2nd March, 1893, Bro. John Baker, gave to the Lodge a section of one rood on Chapman Street (on which the building now stands). On the 27th July, the meeting records the receipt of Certificate of Title; Vol. 155, Fol. 53, Lot 115, R.S. 21371. This was the commencment of a long effort to provide for the future welfare of Freemasonry in the Methven District. Sufficient funds had been donated to ensure that the building would be built free of debt.

On the 25th October, 1906, the building fund was \$183/8/0 and general fund \$57/4/6, a total of \$240/12/6. A building committee was set up consisting of W. Bro. D. Stoba, W.M., W. Bros. J. T. Mangin, J. Gillanders, H. T. Knight and Bros. A. McFarlane J. Baker and T. A. Cloudesley. They were empowered to draw up plans and obtain estimates of costs, and submit same at the next regular meeting. This was done, the estimate cost was two hundred and thirty pounds. The contract to build was let to W. Bro. Stoba. W.M., a leading builder in the District. At the January meeting, the building committee recommended increasing the length of the building by eight feet to provide a cloak room. This recommendation was approved.

On the 28th March, 1907, Bro. S. Rolls presented a new kerosene lamp for the new Lodge room, this lamp hung from the ceiling in the centre of the room. The last meeting was held in the Library on the

11th April, 1907, and the first meeting in the new Lodge building was on the 25th April. The final payment of twenty-two pounds ten shillings was made to the builder. It was resolved that a wood and coal shed be built, and W. Bro. Stoba was instructed to do the work. At the following meeting on the 23rd May, it was resolved that the regular meeting be held on the Wednesday on or before the full moon; previous to this meeting it was held on the Thursday as approved by the District Grand Lodge, S.C. It was necessary to add a refectory, and this was built in 1909, at a cost of one hundred and ten pounds. In 1954 it was again found necessary to enlarge the size of the Lodge room as the membership was 142 Brethren. W. Bro. A. E. Hepburn, builder, was engaged to do the work on an hourly basis, with volunteer labour from many Brethren. The work entailed removing two fireplaces, and the partition wall bringing the old cloak room into the Lodge room. A more spacious waiting room, with modern kitchenette and inside toilet facilities were added at a cost of approximately one thousand pounds. Many Lodge Brethren donated towards the cost, and the sum of \$342/19/9 was received. In 1969 the building was roughcasted and painted at a contract price of \$653.

On the 6th March, 1912, W. Bro. Jas. Gillanders, the Secretary, reported that the adjourning section of one rood had been purchased from Bro. John Baker for the sum of fifty pounds. At the same meeting it was also resolved that the grounds be planted in trees, but this work was not done until 69 years later, when at the June Meeting of 1971, the Lodge approved of the grounds being planted in ornamental trees and shrubs with a scree garden in the front of the building. In 1973, it was decided to improve the refectory for the 90th Anniversary.

The question of Consecration of the new Lodge room was debated at the first meeting held on the 25th April, 1907, and it was agreed to prospone the Ceremony until a future occasion, and in the meantime not to let the building for any purpose.

By an oversight the Consecration was not carried out until the regular meeting held on Wednesday, the 12th January, 1921. The Ceremony of Consecration with Corn, Wine, Oil and Salt was conducted by R.W. Bro. S. C. Bingham, Deputy Grand Master, and the Officers of Grand Lodge. V.W. Bro. Rev. A. H. Julius, Grand Chaplain, completed the Ceremony with Incense. The Deputy Grand Master then declared the Lodge Rightly and Properly Consecrated according to Ancient Custom. W. Bro. S. Smith was the W.M.

During the first seven years of the Lodge Freemasonry throughout New Zealand was under three Constitutions namely; England, Scotland and Ireland, whose Grand Masters were all domiciled in the United Kingdom. As the numbers of Lodges increased a movement to form a Grand Lodge in New Zealand was mooted. The Grand Lodge of N.Z. was formed in Christchurch, April, 1890, when The Methven Lodge decided to sever it's connection as No. 694, S.C. and became No. 51 on the Register of the Grand Lodge of N.Z. dated 29th May, 1890.

In common with many Lodges, Methven had its good and bad times. During the first year the R.W. Master, Bro. John Loudon only presided at the first two regular meetings when accompanied by his brother the Substitute Master left the District to farm at St. Andrews, in South Canterbury. This left the Lodge without a Master or a Past Master. However, help and assistance was forth coming W. Bro. W. Sparrow of Thistle Lodge, No. 627, S.C., W. Bro. H. Stephenson of Somerset Lodge, No. 1811 E.C., W. Bro. A. McKeig, W.M. and W. Bro. C. A. C. Hardy, P.M. of South Rakaia Lodge, No. 1857 E.C. conducted the following five meeting. On the 7th August, 1884, R.W. Bro. Rev. James Hill, District Grand Master, assisted by W. Bros. McKeig and Hardy, both of South Rakaia Lodge, and W. Bro. Simpson of Robert Burns Lodge, No. 604 S.C., Installed Bro. Robert Patton as R.W. Master. He also occupied the Chair for the following year.

Eight candidates were Initiated in the first year; and a total of twenty-five in the first decade.

Occasionally in the 1890's the Lodge had difficulty in carrying on with only five or seven Brethren attending meetings. It was thought at one stage of forwarding the Charter back to the Grand Master, but the Brethren remained loyal to their founders, and carried on through those difficult years. To those few Brethren must go the credit for the ultimate success and continuity that has been achieved. The late W. Bro. J. T. Mangin, was forceful among those few Brethren. He was a farm overseer on "Viewmount," when Initiated on the 22nd January, 1891. His five sons were all Installed as Masters, in later years. The eldest son Frank, like his father was Installed as Master for the second time.

In the decade before the first World War the Lodge Initiated forty-four Brethren, and it was during this period that the Lodge became firmly established. There were two peak years which are of interest. On the 3rd May 1906, three Entered Apprentices received their Fellow Craft Degree. The Lodge was then Raised to the Third Degree, when Bro. David Stoba, Master Elect was Installed as W.M. During his year in Office, he Initiated eleven Brethren. Passed fourteen, and Raised thirteen, a total of thirty-eight Degrees. On the 22nd November, 1906, four Brethren were Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Masons, three more on the 7th February 1907, and three on the 11th April, 1907. This was the last meeting held in the Public Library.

The second peak year was 1925-1926 year when W. Bro. W. T. P. Lock was the W.M. Twelve Brethren were Initiated, twelve Passed, and twelve Raised, a total of thirty-six Degrees. On the 14th October, 1925, two Brethren were Initiated namely Bros. J. R. Dalton and H. L. Mangin. During the Ceremony they both "Relied on such sure support and accompanied their guide with a firm but humble confidence," by Bro. Jas Cook, the Junior Deacon. While the two candidates were being "Restored to their personal comfort," the Lodge was opened in the Second Degree, and three family brothers namely Bros. F. S.,

J. A. and D. McDonald were Passed to the Fellow Craft Degree under their guide Bro. F. G. Mangin, the Senior Deacon. When the Lodge was lowered to the First Degree the two Entered Apprentices were admitted to receive The Charge After Initiation. The Lodge closed with a total of five Brethren receiving a Degree at the one meeting.

The membership of the Lodge during the ten decades was as follows: 1883 Foundation Officers 11, plus Bro. Thomas Walter Longuet, grocer, Lincoln Lodge, No. 1918 E.C., who signed the attendance book as a member at the first four meetings. In 1893, 17 members; 1903, 26; 1913, 61; 1923, 80; 1933, 94; 1943, 124; 1953, 134; 1963, 146, 1973, 109; and October, 1983, 76. The highest number of Brethren in the Lodge recorded on Grand Lodge returns was December 1961, with 150 Brethren, the highest number in a country lodge in the Canterbury Province. In 1958, the 75th Anniversary year there were nine Stewards Invested at the Installation dated 14th May. Since the Lodge was Consecrated, 315 Brethren have been Initiated, 115 as Joining members, plus the Foundation members of 12, a total of 442 Brethren.

During their year in Office, six Most Worshipful Grand Masters of N.Z. have Officially visited the Lodge. On the 21st May, 1891, M.W. Bro. Henry Thomson; Installation of W. Bro. James Gillanders. On the 13th May, 1915, M.W. Bro. John Joseph Dougall; Installation of W. Bro. Robert McKee. On the 15th May, 1922, M.W. Bro. Thomas Ross; Installation of W. Bro. Alexis B. Adams. On the 11th May, 1949, M.W. Bro. Colonel Sir Stephen Shepherd Allen; Installation of W. Bro. Leonard R. Mangin. On the 12th May, 1965, M.W. Bro. John Stanley Hawker; Installation of W. Bro. J. Charles Thompson. On the 11th August, 1976, M.W. Bro. Arthur Edmund Shuttleworth; visited the Lodge when a Fellow Craft Degree was worked; W. Bro. George W. Currie was the W.M., his father V.W. Bro. W. J. Currie, was in Office as G.D.C.

His Excellency, The Governor General, Sir Charles Fergusson, Grand Master, a guest at the Methven Agricultural and Pastoral Show on Thursday, 31st March, 1927, expressed the wish to visit the Lodge Room. He signed his name in the attendance book. He was accompanied by twenty-one other Brethren from different Lodges who also signed. W. Bro. Arthur W. Bremer was the W.M. during that year.

The Lodge Celebrated it's Golden Jubilee on the 11th October, 1933, Grand Lodge was represented by R.W. Bro. J. N. Du Feu, Deputy Grand Master, the Prov. Grand Master was R.W. Bro. C. Flavell; W. Bro. H. L. Mangin was the W.M.

The Sixtieth Anniversary was Celebrated on the 13th October, 1943, Grand Lodge was represented by R.W. Bro. C. Flavell, P.Dep. G.M., The Prov. G.M. was R.W. Bro. C. S. Thompson; W. Bro. F. S. McDonald was the W.M.

The Seventy-fifth Anniversary was Celebrated on the 8th October, 1958. Grand Lodge was represented by M.W. Bro. C. S. Thompson,

P.G.M. The Prov. G.M. was R.W. Bro. J. S. Hawker. W. Bro. C. A. Corbett was the W.M.

The Nintieth Anniversary was Celebrated on the 10th October, 1973. Grand Lodge was represented by R.W. Bro. L. C. H. Suckling, P.Prov. G.M. V.W. Bro. W. I. Anstey, Asst. Prov. G.M. represented R.W. Bro. I. L. Tie, Prov. G.M. owing to his unavoidable absence. W. Bro. C. W. H. Thomson was the W.M.

The Lodge has had many excellent Masters during the past hundred years, eleven of whom have served more than one year in the Chair. V.W. Bro. James Gillanders, P.G. Supt. of W., was Installed as Master on six different occasions. He was balloted and Initiated on the evening of the 24th May, 1888. V.W. Bro. Gillanders was Headmaster of the Methven School from 1887 until his retirement. in 1916. On leaving the District, the Lodge elected him an Honorary Member, and presented him with a Secretary's Jewel after serving the Office for nineteen years at different periods between 1892-1916. Many pupils at school during his years as Master eventually became members of the Craft because of the example he set. V.W. Bro. Gillanders kept up his membership, and when Lodge Shirley, No. 263 was Consecrated in 1924, he joined up and took an active interest in its administration. He was the originator of the exchange of Gavels between Lodge Shirley and The Methven Lodge. The first Fraternal Visit was on Wednesday. the 10th December, 1924, when W. Bro. Charles H. Burson, W.M. of Lodge Shirley, and his Officers visited The Methven Lodge and worked a double Third Degree on their own two candidates, Bros. George Finney and Arthur H. Henry.

Another Annual Exchange of Gavels is with Cashmere Lodge, No. 271, also Consecrated in 1924. W. Bro. Walter Fairclough, W.M., a practising dentist in Christchurch and Methven. The first Fraternal Visit was to The Methven Lodge on the Wednesday, 9th October, 1935, when he and his Officers worked a Second Degree on their own candidate, Bro. Reginald R. Taylor.

The first Fraternal Visit to The Methven Lodge to take over the Officers Chairs was dated the 6th January, 1909. W. Bro. J. Harris, W.M., of Thistle Lodge, No. 113, and his Officers, Raised to the Third Degree, Bros. W. H. Maginness, A. C. Street and H. E. A. Lock, all members of The Methven Lodge.

Other Lodges in the Canterbury Province to work Degrees were Lodges Unanimity, No. 3; Lincoln, No. 33; Christchurch, No. 91; Robert Burns, No. 139; Ahurewa, No. 181; Amuri, No. 184; Erewhon, No. 200; Ionic, No. 212; Sumner, No. 242 and Harmony, No. 325.

Annual Fraternal Visits were commenced in 1977 when W. Bro. Geo. W. Currie was the W.M. These visits concerned Lodges in Canterbury, meeting on the second Wednesday of each month similar

to Methven, namely St. Augustine, No. 99 and United Forces, No. 245. These meetings are held at Methven in January, and the Worshipful Masters and Officers of each Lodge take part in the Ceremony for the evening.

The first visit was held on the 12th January, 1977, and has since proved successful, bringing together the Officers and Brethren of each Lodge.

At a meeting held on the 8th September, 1892, seven Brethren were in attendance, and a motion was carried by four votes to three that a Social be held in connection with the Lodge to entertain the ladies. It was decided that a charge be made for admission, and any surplus above expenses be placed into the building fund. The Secretary was instructed to apply to Grand Lodge for a Dispensation to wear Regalia. The Lodge agreed not to advertise the social in the newspapers. The first Social in full Regalia worn by the Brethren was held on the Friday, 14th October, 1892, in the School room on Jackson Street. At the following meeting the W.M. announced that one pound profit from the Social had been paid into the Building Fund. A meeting dated 9th August, 1911, it was resolved that owing to the sudden death of W. Bro. D. Stoba, Grand Steward, the Lodge go into mourning for three months. The Social which had now become known as the Conversazione was cancelled for that year. Masonic Conversaziones continued to be held in the Town Hall, Bank Street, and Dispensations were granted to wear Regalia at a fee of two guineas. At the meeting held on the 9th July, 1930, a letter was received from the Provincial Grand Secretary, Christchurch, stated that the wearing of Regalia at Conversaziones was contrary to the Book of Constitution. The meeting resolved that permission be asked to wear Regalia in the Grand March only; but this request was also refused. The Conversaziones now known as Annual Balls have been held regularly and are popular.

Six Brethren gave service in the Great War 1914-18, two making the Supreme Sacrifice, both being killed in France, dated Bro. F. B. Adams, 11/10/16 and Bro. A. S. McClintock, 8/11/16. Fifteen Brethren gave service in the Second World War, 1939-1945. Bro. E. C. Hart was killed 7/1/43 in North Canterbury while training in the Air Force for his pilot's licence. At the meeting dated 9th July, 1919, it was resolved that the Lodge erect two Honours Boards, one for our Brethren who had served during the war, and the other a record of the Past Masters of the Lodge. At the meeting dated 13th July, 1927, the W.M., W. Bro. S. Robinson, referred to the Plaque erected on the North-West wall of the Lodge room. The Lodge Chaplain read a Passage from the Book of Wisdom, after which the W.M. asked W. Bro. J. T. Mangin to perform the Ceremony of Unveiling the War Memorial Plaque. The Ceremony concluded with the singing of the National Anthem. The cost of the Plaque engraved was fourteen pounds, and reads as follows:

The Lodge on the death of a Brother observe mourning for a month, but only on one occasion during the hundred years has the W.M. summoned an emergency meeting which took place in the Lodge room, upstairs at Patton's Hotel, on the 22nd October, 1889, because of the death of W. Bro. Patton, the Secretary. The W.M. and Officers in the Third Degree performed the Funeral Ritual of Questions and Answers, after which the Brethren and visiting Brethren conducted the remains of the late respected Brother to the Cemetery and there "In a grave already prepared." After the Religious Service, Bro. Milsom of Thistle Lodge, No. 627 S.C. performed the Masonic Burial Rites, after which the Brethren returned to the Lodge Room to close the meeting in Ancient Form and Custom at 4 p.m. The Lodge erected a Masonic Headstone, at the cost of \$18/14/6 and engraved:

On three occasions there have been Fraternal Visits by Methven Lodge Brethren to Lodge Kildrummie, No. 906 S.C., in Methven, a country village in Perthshire, Scotland. On the 2nd September, 1924, W. Bro. W. W. Goodwin, and Bro. A. W. Menown, attended the Lodge while on a visit to the Old Country. W. Bro, Jas. Campbell, on a similar visit attended the Lodge in Methven, on the 18th June, 1935, and there presented a Gavel on behalf of his Lodge in N.Z. This Gavel is on the Senior Warden's Pedestal, and used at the regular meeting. In exchange W. Bro. Campbell received a Chisel which has been regularly explained at all Initiation Ceremonies. Bro. Geo. L. McRobb, on a visit back to the "Country of his Birth and Infant Nurture" in Scotland also attended Lodge Kildrummie on the 6th October, 1960, and there extended greetings from The Methven Lodge, No. 51, N.Z.C. He was presented with a Gavel which was handed to W. Bro. A. E. Hepburn, W.M. on the 8th February, 1961. This Gavel is on the Master's Pedestal, and used on all occasions.

To date there has not yet been a visit to The Methven Lodge in N.Z. by a Kildrummie brother, but the W.M, and Brethren look forward to the occasion in the future.

JEWELS PRESENTED TO BRETHREN

The first gold jewel to be presented within the Lodge's history was on the 22nd May, 1902. R.W. Bro. C. A. C. Hardy, P. Dep. G.M. presented W. Bro. Jas. Gillanders, I.P.M. with a Past Master's Jewel. There were no others presented until the 21st July, 1915, when W. Bro. A. Murray, I.P.M. received his Past Master's Jewel.

A Past Master's Jewel Fund was commenced, and on the 6th September, 1916, R.W. Bro. John Thornton, Prov. G.M., presented five Past Master's Jewels to the following Brethren: W. Bros. J. T. Mangin, J. Duff, W. J. Blackler, D. Duff and R. McKee.

Since that date every Past Master after having served in the Master's Chair, has been a recipient of a Past Master's Jewel.

W. Bro. A. L. Mangin, I.P.M. in 1955 was presented with his late father's jewel. W. Bro. G. W. Currie, I.P.M. was in 1977 presented with his grandfather's jewel, namely the late W. Bro. Geo. Currie, dated 12th May, 1943.

SECRETARY'S JEWEL

The first Secretary's Jewel was present to W. Bro. J. Gillanders on the 12th April, 1916, on his retirement to Christchurch. He served the Office for nineteen years on various occasions.

A second jewel was presented to W. Bro. W. J. Currie, on the 8th June, 1966, after serving the Office for fourteen years.

TREASURER'S JEWEL

The first Treasurer's Jewel was presented to Bro. A. Orchard dated 10th September, 1930, he having served the Office for two years 1927-29. A second jewel was presented to the present Treasurer Bro. E. H. Clibborn on the 9th July, 1980. Bro. Clibborn has now served the Office for fifteen years.

ALMONER'S JEWEL

An Almoner's Jewel was presented to W. Bro. T. A. Gutberlet, on the 13th August, 1969, after serving the Office for thirteen years. In May, 1976, he was again Invested as Almoner of the Lodge. He has now served the Office for a period of nineteen years.

ORGANIST JEWEL

An Organist Jewel was presented to Bro. W. F. S. Jones, on the 9th May, 1934, after being in Office for five years.

THE PAST MASTERS JEWEL

This jewel worn by the Past Masters of the Lodge is significant. The designer must have been well versed in Scottish Folklore to give us the jewel we wear today.

Our fair town and of course the Methven Lodge No. 51, take their names from the original village and district in Perthshire close to Scone, the seat of the ancient Kings of Scotland. The district of Methven was, Folklore tells us, peopled by the bodyguards or defenders of those kings, and as well as being freeholders of their lands. They were by royal decree allowed to have a family crest, surrounded by a belt, just as we have the Pythagorean Theorem surrounded by a belt. The significance of the belt is that it is a sword belt worn over the right shoulder and under the left arm to carry the large and fearsome weapon known as the "Claymore."

A jewel that links us to a band of loyal men and mighty warriors.

THE WORSHIPFUL MASTER'S JEWEL

This jewel pendant from the Master's Collar is unusual in that it contains not only the square, but also the compasses, held in position by an arc of a circle, graduated. These were the instruments used by operative masons.

In our case this is an emblem wrought in silver. The jewel is a replica of that Most Worshipful Grand Master of Scotland whose jewel is wrought in gold.

GIFTS PRESENTED TO THE LODGE

The first was on the 2nd March, 1893, when Bro. John Baker gifted a one rood section on which the Lodge building now stands.

On the 10th January, 1912, W. Bro. Jas. Carr, W.M. presented a D.C. Silver Mounted Baton.

On the 13th October, 1920, W. Bro. S. Smith, W. M., presented a set of Working Tools enclosed in an Oak case. On the same evening, six beautiful carved oak chairs were presented to the Lodge. Bro. J. Osborne presented the S.W.s; Bro. W. T. P. Lock, the J.W.s; W. Bro. H. Maginness, the Chaplains; W. Bro. W. W. Goodwin, the D.C.; Bro. A. B. Adams, the S.D.s; and Bro. J. Campbell, the J.D.s. On the 12th March, 1924, W. Bros. H. H. Pawson, H. Maginness and S. Smith all presented the six blue cushions for the gifted chairs.

On the 14th May, 1924, W. Bro. R. Holland, presented the three Columns containing the Lesser Lights and attached to the W.M.; S.W.; and J.W. Pedestals.

On the 12th November, 1941, W. Bro. F. G. Mangin, the Secretary, presented to the W.M., on behalf of Bro. W. M. Holland, on active service in the Middle East, a Stone Gavel procured from the site of King Solomon's Quarry. It is in a glass framed case attached to the South Wall of the Lodge room.

The Past Masters Honours Board first mentioned on the 9th July, 1919 was presented to the Lodge on the 10th November, 1954, as a token from the Mangin Brothers. R.W. Bro. S. C. Sherrard, Prov.

G.M. at the request of W. Bro. A. L. Mangin, W.M., took the candidates V.S.L. (Bro. R. T. Cochrane, who was newly Initiated) and from the West read Deut. Ch. 32, v. 7., and while the Brethren were standing, R.W. Bro. Sherrard unveiled this handsome gift.

The Brethren of the Lodge subscribed the cost of the gold painting.

On the 13th February, 1963, W. Bro. W. J. Currie presented the Lodge with the Lectern. This was the evening his son Bro. Geo. W. Currie, a Lewis was Initiated.

On the 13th January, 1965, Bro. F. P. Ashfield, presented a framed photo of Her Majesty the Queen. This was the evening his younger brother, Alan, was Initiated.

On the 10th November, 1971, W. Bro. R. A. Page, gifted a glass front book cupboard for the purpose of a Masonic Library.

On the 11th August, 1976, Bro. B. M. Shearer made and presented a glass front cabinet to hold the jewels of deceased Brethren.

W. Bro. A. L. Mangin, W.M., 1954-55 gifted the silver knockers on the door.

The first Volume of the Sacred Law to be presented to a newly Raised Master Mason was to Bro. A. J. Wilson, on the 15th January, 1919, and every Raised Brother has since been the recipient of a Volume on which he was Obligated in the Three Degrees.

ITEMS OF INTEREST

The Lodge did not possess Regalia until the 19th August, 1886, when W. Bro. C. A. C. Hardy offered to purchase on behalf of the Lodge from England eleven collars and jewels. The jewels to be solid silver and not plated.

On the 15th January, 1908, it was resolved to improve the furnishing by altering the Wardens Pedestals and procure the Master's Chair. On the 20th June, an account from Messrs. A. J. White Ltd., Christchurch value \$11/5/0 was passed for payment.

The first Organ was purchased from Mrs. H. T. Knight, on the 24th November, 1909, and the first Organist to be Invested was Bro. H. E. A. Lock. This organ was replaced in 1968 by one purchased from St. John's Presbyterian Church, at the cost of \$14.

On the 12th June, 1910, an account of ten shillings was paid to Newmans Livery Stables, for hire of coach to transport Grand Lodge Officers from the Railway Station to the Hotel. On the 23rd June, 1915, Bro. J. F. Newman was Initiated.

On the 5th June, 1912, W. Bro. A. C. Andrews of Christchurch Lodge, No. 91, gave a Lecture on Royal Arch Masonry. From the minutes dated the 13th June, 1923, it was resolved that Rose and Thistle Royal Arch Chapter, No. 35, Ashburton, be granted the use of the Lodge building. By Dispensation from the Supreme Grand

Chapter, the first convocation was held on Saturday, 11th August, 1923, and three further meetings followed, two in 1924, and one in 1927. The Chapter at these four convocations Advanced ten Methven Brethren to the Degree of Mark Master Masons. The Rose and Thistle Royal Arch Chapter was Consecrated on Friday, 15th May, 1914, and W. Bro. James Gillanders was a Foundation Companion. He was Elevated to the Rank of Right Excellent Grand Superintendant of the Canterbury District for two year term 1928 and 1929.

The first Masonic Church Service was observed on St.John's Day, which was on Sunday, 23rd May, 1915, held in St. John's Presbyterian Church. The Preacher was the Bro. Rev. Geo. K. Aitken, a member of the Lodge.

On the 28th April, 1915, the Lodge purchased six long seats covered with light blue material at the cost of \$29/5/0. These comfortable seats are still in the Lodge room.

Minutes dated 26th December, 1917, which was Boxing Day, a letter received from Master "Monty" Holland, asking particulars as regards price of cocksfoot growing on the Lodge grounds. Resolved that Master Holland be given the seed. On the 12th October, 1927, at the age of twenty-one, Bro. W. M. Holland was Initiated. The following year W. Bro. Jas. Duff's son was granted the seed.

Rates paid to the Mt. Hutt Road Board in 1922, was \$1/18/2, the amount to be paid to the Ashburton County Council for the 1983 current year is \$161.98.

The piano in the Refectory was purchased by the courtesy of Bro. F. S. Barrett, a local jeweller in 1926, at the cost of \$47/16/3, landed in Methyen.

In 1930, a small steel safe was purchased for three pounds.

The electric fan situated in the centre of the Lodge room was donated by the Brethren in 1941, at a total cost of \$23/10/0.

The first Lodge picnic for Brethren, families and invited friends was held on New Year's Day, 1923. The place for the picnic was W. Bro. Adam Long's river bed property. Bro. J. C. Grubb, Garage Proprietor with his truck offered to transport families from the Lodge room to the site. W. Bro. W. C. Battson and Bro. Geo. Currie were asked to purchase the necessary toys and lollies.

An account for \$13/3/8 was later paid to Currie's Store. The writer was present at the picnic as a lad then aged eleven.

In 1886, the Lodge transferred from the Methven School to the Assembly room upstairs at Patton's Methven Hotel until 1890. The only entrance was by an outside stairway. This room was sound proof, the space between the inner and outer walls being filled with clay.

The builder of the Hotel was Bro. John Scrimgeour, the first Junior Warden. He married a sister of W. Bro. Patton.

It is recorded that in January, 1921, when the Grand Lodge Officers came up by train from Christchurch for the Consecration of the Lodge, they had left the Incense Burner behind, and the Ceremony could not be completed without it. W. Bro. Harry Maginness, always a humourist suggested that the local Catholic Priest be approached for the use of their Church's Burner. With the consent of the R.W. Dep. G.M., W. Bro. Maginness's suggestion was agreed to. He then approached Rev. Father Price, who gladly offered the use of the burner, giving instructions as to how it should be operated. He also wished the Lodge a very successful evening.

On looking back on our early Brethren one must record their enthusiasm in attending Lodge meetings. The mode of travelling in those days was a horse and gig. For visiting Brethren from Ashburton it was a two hour trip in a coach and same on the return journey.

The records of the Lodge's one hundred years have been faithfully preserved, and thanks are due to the Worshipful Masters and Officers for the care that has been exercised in their preservation. All minute books and attendance registers since 1883 are complete and in safe keeping.

The Brethren of the Lodge who have served as Officers have vivid recollections of the Preceptors in past years, insisting upon them keeping strictly to the printed Ritual. The Worshipful Masters, Officers and Brethren have always endeavoured to uphold the Principals of Freemasonry, and kept the Degree work up to the high standard that has been set in the past.

The Lodge's last two Secretaries have served in Office for a total of fifty continuous years. The late W. Bro. F. G. Mangin, P.G.D., served the Office for nineteen years, from May, 1933, and on his death in June, 1952, the present Secretary has continued in this Office.

The W.M. and the Centennial Committee under the guidance of their Chairman, W. Bro. R. T. Cochrane. and Brethren of the Lodge are grateful that M.W. Bro. Andrew M. Dick, Grand Master, is being in attendance. We are thankful too for the guidance and co-operation of R.W. Bro. Raymond J. Duncan, Prov. Grand Master, who has so willingly assisted the Committee in procedure, and for his personal attendance at the August regular meeting to confirm the many details.

Brethren, this recorded history is but a few of many interesting incidents which have taken place over the past Century. A celebration is always an occasion for looking back. The writer is thankful for the assistance of the Brethren on the Centennial Committee, for their labour and many hours of support to make the celebrations a success.

The W.M. and Brethren of the Lodge are conscious of the heritage handed down to us as a result of the enthusiasm and self sacrifice of our early Brethren. Therefore let us by precept and example show to the world what Freemasonry has to offer.

This is a time when we would express our grateful thanks to The Great Architect of the Universe for His goodness and mercy to us over the past one hundred years. But we must not dwell on the past, but look ahead into the future with a determination to continue in the service of Freemasonry, so that the world may be a better and safer place for those who come after us.
